IGPA Activities

The IGPA Strategic Plan

One of the major activities during the past year has been the development of the Institute's strategic plan for the next five to ten years. The plan provides us with a clear road map for the future development of IGPA and has been widely praised by senior university administrators. As a result of this effort, IGPA has been promised increased budgets for the next five years.

Medicaid Managed Care—Is the Time Right for Illinois?

On Oct. 21, IGPA sponsored this legislative workshop to provide legislators and other interested parties with an objective, non-partisan assessment of the merits of expanding Medicaid managed care in Illinois. Scholars and professionals from Medicaid programs in Illinois and Michigan made presentations at the workshop, which was held 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. at UIC.

The Family Impact Seminar: What Works in Reducing Crime? A Family Perspective for State Policymaking

The Family Impact Seminars are objective and nonpartisan briefings that offer state legislators research-informed options for policy problems. During each legislative session, an advisory board identifies the most pressing family policy issues facing the state. Expert working groups determine which issue can be best addressed with existing research knowledge. Nationally-recognized experts who are skilled at translating research for legislative audiences speak at the briefings and write a concise briefing report. This year's seminar, "What Works in Reducing Crime? A Family Perspective for State Policymaking", was held Feb. 23 at the Sangamo Club.

NEW Leadership Summer Institute

The NEW Leadership Summer Institute is a non-partisan, week-long residential program for college women designed to increase women's representation in all elements of public life, including elected office. The week-long program includes workshops and panel discussions that offer knowledge about the political process and leadership skills' training. These activities are combined with a variety of hands-on experiences so that students actively participate in the learning process and practice the skills that they are learning. This year's program was held in late May and early June at the UIC campus..

Craig Bazzani Lecture in Public Affairs

James Jackson, Director of the Institute for Social Research at the University of Michigan, delivered the Bazzani Lecture in Public Affairs, "Red States v. Blue States," on November 30, 2005.

Health Policy Symposium

Working with the UIC School of Public Health's Division of Health Policy and Administration, IGPA co-hosted a successful inaugural Health Policy Symposium. John

Wennberg, Director of the Center for Evaluative Clinical Sciences and Peggy Y. Thompson Professor of Evaluative Clinical Sciences at Dartmouth Medical School, was the keynote speaker, talking on “Understanding Variations in Medical Practice.” This symposium brought in key health leaders from the Chicago area and was supported by a grant from the Sigmund Edelstone Fund of the Michael Reese Health Trust.

Illinois Legislative Latino Caucus Public Policy Institute

We worked with President White in developing a Memorandum of Understanding with the Illinois Legislative Latino Caucus Foundation to develop the Illinois Legislative Latino Caucus Public Policy Institute. This memorandum states that IGPA will work with the Latino Legislative Caucus on collaborative public policy projects.

Rate Analysis of the State Reimbursement Levels Awarded to Mental Health and Developmentally Disabled Community Providers

The sum of \$300,000 was appropriated by the General Assembly to conduct, in cooperation with the Department of Human Services and representative community providers, a comprehensive rate analysis of the state reimbursement levels awarded to mental health and developmentally disabled community providers. The preliminary report has been provided, work on the final report is continuing.

Policy Luncheon Series (Springfield)

IGPA continued the very successful Policy Luncheon Series in collaboration with the UIS Center for State Policy and Leadership. This series is held in Springfield and featured topics such as:

September 28: Illinois Attorney General Lisa Madigan, “The Role of the Attorney General in Illinois and the Nation.”

October 27: Latino Political Power, The panel, which included Acting Director of the Mexican American Legal Defense and Education Fund Jorge Sanchez, assessed the impacts of demographic trends, with an eye toward what changes we will see in the near- and medium-term future.

December 6: Transparency and Accountability in Government. This panel, led by media attorney Don Craven, examined the trend of growing secrecy at all levels of government and efforts to keep government transparent and accountable to the people.

February 6: Pensions and the State Budget. A panel of experts including John Filan, director of the Governor’s Office of Management and Budget, discussed issues related to public pensions and the impact of public pension financing on the overall state budget.

March 13: Analysis of the Primary Election. IGPA’s Monday-morning quarterbacks — former Governor Jim Edgar, former State Representative and Professor Jim Nowlan, Professors Samuel Gove, Kent Redfield, and Chris Mooney — were among those examining the results of the primary.

Policy Luncheon Series (Chicago)

IGPA also launched a new Policy Luncheon Series in collaboration with the Union League Club in Chicago. This series featured topics including:

October 18: Transparency and Accountability in Government. Panelists included: Craig Dellimore, Political Editor of WBBM Newsradio 780; Alan Gitelson, Professor of

Political Science at Loyola University in Chicago; Bernie Judge, Editor and Publisher of the Chicago Daily Law Bulletin and Chicago Lawyer; Lori Lightfoot, former First Deputy for Procurement for the City of Chicago; Dick Simpson, UIC Political Science Professor and former Chicago Alderman.

March 15: Analysis of the Primary Election. IGPA’s Monday-morning quarterbacks — former Governor Jim Edgar, former State Representative and Professor Jim Nowlan, Professors Samuel Gove, Kent Redfield, and Chris Mooney — were among those examining the results of the primary.

April 6: An expert panel looked at housing issues in Chicago and the suburbs, with a special emphasis on “teardowns.” Panelists included Cathy Czerniak, director of community development for the city of Lake Forest; Richard Dye, IGPA and economics professor at Lake Forest College; Afshan Hamid, design planner for the village of Arlington Heights; Daniel McMillen, IGPA and economics professor at the University of Illinois at Chicago; and Jim Peters of the Landmarks Preservation Council of Illinois.

May 22: Pensions. An expert panel examined both public and private pensions, and the growing problems associated with them.

Higher Education Update

IGPA provided the Illinois Board of Higher Education with an update to the report IGPA did on “Illinois Higher Education: Building the Economy, Shaping Society.” This update was distributed and used at the IBHE summit in November of 2005

Political Leaders Series

Governor Edgar continued with his Political Leaders seminar series. This year’s speaker was Representative Tom Cross, minority leader in the Illinois House.

Midwest Conference on Best Practices in Corporate Social Responsibility and Sustainability

IGPA collaborated with the Urbana campus in offering the “Midwest Conference on Best Practices in Corporate Social Responsibility and Sustainability.” This conference was held June 22 at the Union League Club in Chicago. Speakers included UIUC Chancellor Richard Herman; Robert Zischg, consul general of Austria; Reeta Roy, divisional vice president for global citizenship and policy, Abbott Laboratories; Gavin Power, head of advocacy and public affairs, United Nations Global Compact; and Phillip H. Rudolph, vice president and general counsel, Ethical Leadership Group.

Cooperation with the Jane Addams Hull House Association

Building on the relationship developed from the Family Impact Seminar, IGPA and Hull House Association signed a memorandum of understanding to collaborate on community-based policy seminars/workshops in the area of race and public policy.

Collaboration with State Agencies

IGPA developed two new collaborative relationships with major state agencies. The first is with the Illinois Department of Revenue and second with the Illinois Department of

Commerce and Economic Opportunity. The IDOR collaboration led to a contract which resulted in a highly visible report developed by Dan McMillen, David Merriman, Dick Dye, and Fred Giertz. The DCEO collaboration has led to a contract which focuses on the Illinois economy and the business climate in Illinois

IGPA Seminar Series

The UIC IGPA office had a very successful Thursday lunch series organized by Lorens Helmchen; this series featured such notable speakers including:

September 1: Nathan Anderson, an Assistant Professor in the Department of Economics at UIC, presented “Beggar Thy Neighbor? Property Taxation of Vacation Homes.”

October 3: Karen A. Mossberger, UIC Associate Professor in the Graduate Program in Public Affairs Administration in the College of Urban Planning and Public Affairs, spoke on “race, place, and information technology.”

November 3: Robert W. Fogel, winner of the 1993 Nobel Prize in Economic Sciences and Charles R. Walgreen Distinguished Service Professor of American Institutions in the Graduate School of Business at the University of Chicago, discussed why China is likely to achieve its growth objectives.

February 2: Anup Malani from the University of Chicago Law School spoke about “valuing laws as local amenities”.

March 2: Derek Neal from the University of Chicago gave a talk titled “Why Has Black-White Skill Convergence Stopped?”

Rural Health Initiative

Norman Daniels, Professor of Ethics and Population Health at Harvard School of Public Health, lectured October on “Why Justice Is Good for Our Health” as part of a rural health initiative co-sponsored by IGPA, the Women and Gender in Global Perspectives Program and the Department of Agricultural and Consume Economics. This event, organized by IGPA affiliate Noreen Sugrue and Paul McNamara of the Department of Agricultural and Consume Economics, took place October 17.

Visit by European Parliament Member Glyn Ford

Glyn Ford, Labour Member of the European Parliament since 1984, visited the UIUC campus in November 8 and 9. Mr. Ford has four main areas of interest: Foreign Affairs, East Asia, the rising tide of racism and Europe. Throughout his visit, he met with students and faculty from a number of different departments and academic units. He also gave lectures entitled “The New Economic and World Order” and “The Future of the European Union.”

Paul H. Douglas Ethics in Government Program

On behalf of the University of Illinois, the Paul H. Douglas Ethics in Government Program, its donors, and members of the Douglas family, University of Illinois President B. Joseph White presented the 2005 Paul H. Douglas Ethics in Government Award in Washington, D.C. at the Library of Congress on April 25. The recipients of the 2005 Douglas Award are 9-11 Commission Chairman Thomas H. Kean and Vice Chairman Lee Hamilton.

The Paul H. Douglas Ethics in Government Award was established in 1992 as part of the celebration of the senator's 100th birthday and in recognition of his outstanding service to the people of Illinois and the nation. Paul Douglas was a man of extraordinary integrity and vision, who brought the very best to government and set an example of what others should strive for in public service. Recipients of the award are selected by a committee of nationally known figures from the public and private sectors as well as academe.

Center for Prevention Research and Development

CPRD currently has 37 staff members and two interns and has an operating budget of \$3.2 million. CPRD’s major accomplishments over the past year include:

Partnership for Advancing Prevention Research in State Programs and Policies, an ongoing group of Illinois' highly respected prevention researchers continued to share their knowledge, expertise, and experience to assist policymakers in their efforts to establish research priorities and opportunities that guide state and community level prevention efforts. Current members represent faculty and professional prevention researchers from UIC, UIUC, Northwestern, Illinois State University, Northern Illinois University, Northeastern University, and DePaul University.

As part of the Best Practices Institute Leadership Program for Prevention Policymakers 19 representatives from seven state agencies have met over the last 12 months to engage in professional development, to share experiences, build a learning community, and develop an in-depth understanding of prevention best practices that can be applied to state level policy and practices.

Scott Hayes organized and served as president of the C-U Smokefree Alliance, which worked successfully to bring about a ban on smoking in all public places, including bars and restaurants in Champaign and Urbana.

CPRD developed and implemented an online survey of the Illinois Commission on Volunteerism and Community Service (ICVCS) to support their work in creating a state strategic plan for advancing volunteerism in Illinois.

Susan Witkin consulted regularly with representatives from the Administrative Office of Illinois Courts and Illinois Department of Human Services to improve and utilize data captured in through eJMIS (a web based data system created by CPRD to track key juvenile screening and detention data entered by detention center staff throughout the state).

CPRD provided technical assistance to prevention specialists in the Illinois Department of Human Services Substance Abuse Prevention Program (SAPP) for entering service delivery data into OnTrack. OnTrack is a web-based management information system that provides dynamic reports on services delivered to local prevention managers and SAPP policy makers. This year, an enhancement to OnTrack was piloted with a group of users to begin coding service data with geographic codes. This enhancement will be rolled out system-wide in the coming fiscal year. Standardized geographic codes will facilitate the creation of resource and service maps across the state and within smaller areas to identify where prevention service gaps exist.

CPRD provided a report to the Secretary of the Illinois Department of Human Services, Carol Adams, in response to a request for information about the performance of programs evaluated by CPRD.

CPRD Public Policy Publications

Peter Mulhall prepared two white papers at the request of Dr. Rich based on request from Senator Durbin's office on the methamphetamine problem in Illinois. The first white paper focused on the status and consequences of the meth problem in Illinois, and the second paper focused on a critique of the Montana Meth Project's evaluation of their media campaign.

Peter Mulhall also wrote *Assessing Needs for Afterschools Services for Illinois Children and Families* (2005) published in the *State of the State of Illinois* edited by Cedric Herring IGPA.

To improve the quality of prevention programs and services, the Illinois Department of Human Services contracted CPRD to develop a series of best practices documents based on research-based policies and practices that could be widely disseminated and adopted by Illinois prevention field. These papers can be found on the CPRD website at cprd.uiuc.edu.

CPRD Policy Commentaries

CPRD provided a report to Illinois Department of Human Services in response to a request from the National Association of State Alcohol and Drug Abuse Directors for information to compile a report to Congress in support of the Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment Block Grant funded by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMSA), Department of Health and Human Services.

CPRD submitted a response and public comment regarding the Federal Register publication of changes to the SAMHSA National Outcome Measures.

CPRD provided an analysis and report to Secretary of the Illinois Department of Human Services Carol Adams in response to a request for information about the performance of programs evaluated by CPRD.

Office of Public Leadership

During this past year, the IGPA Office of Public Management changed its name to the Office of Public Leadership. Under the direction of Paul Craig, OPL has been very successful and visible in offering the following programs/seminars:

The Leadership Education and Development Program, provided in collaboration with the Illinois Municipal League, serves mayors and other elected municipal officials just completed its tenth year and has graduated over 250 officials.

OPL, in collaboration with the Illinois Municipal League, launched the “Leadership Forum” which is an advanced course for municipal officials.

As part of the Academy for Municipal Excellence program, the “Leadership Dialogues” program continued during the past year. Six dialogues focusing on different books were presented;

In cooperation with the United Counties Council of Illinois, we are in the third year of providing educational and leadership programs for county officials. This year, OPL launched a new leadership academy for county officials. This new program was started in February of 2006.

OPL finished the third year of its collaboration with the Municipal Clerks of Illinois and signed a contract for the next three years. As part of this program, we collaborate on a week-long educational program for Illinois clerks each October.

Growing out of our work with clerks, Chancellor Herman of UIUC signed a memorandum of understanding with the International Institute for Municipal Clerks to develop educational programs for clerks internationally. This initiative is known as the Athenian Leadership Society.

OPL began a collaboration with the Township Officials of Illinois and have now offered several leadership and educational programs for township officials.

The Regional Institute of Community Policing

The five full-time and six part-time employees of the Regional Institute for Community Policing provide training to community and law enforcement officials. Last year, RICP garnered nearly \$870,000 in grants to support their efforts, including:

DNA Identification, Collection and Preservation for Law Enforcement –Courses were developed for law enforcement officers, as well as citizens, stressing the importance of DNA as it relates to solving crimes.

Ethics for the Individual Officer curriculum was developed for the new FBI virtual academy. RICP content and curriculum personnel served as advisors to this program during which the existing ethics curriculum was reformatted into a self-paced, problem-based, computer-based ethics training program to be taken by FBI agents across the country.

Front Porch Patriots curriculum has been developed to bring homeland security planning to Illinois residents via community groups such as Citizen Police Academies, Citizen Corps, Volunteers In Police Service and other civic groups. It reinforces the concept that “homeland security begins at home.”

RICP was invited to conduct strategic planning for the National Citizen Corps program in Washington, D.C., creating the national mission, vision, goals and objectives for this presidential initiative.

RICP provided technical assistance to the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA) online training course for law enforcement.

RICP provided strategic planning assistance to the Governor's Alcohol Abuse Task Force in addition to preparing the final report due to the Governor in August. The report will contain recommendations and best practices for national application.

Animal Rescue and Restore – Partnering with the ASPCA, RICP is creating a community preparedness process for communities which will now include the planning for, rescue and reunification of domestic animals.

Publications

Report for the Illinois Department of Revenue: The Economic Effects of the 7 Percent Assessment Cap in Cook County

This study examined the effect of the 7 percent assessment cap in Cook County. IGPA economists Richard Dye, Daniel McMillen, and David Merriman calculated what property owners paid with the expanded homestead exemption amount (EHEA) and what they would have paid without it.

State of the State of Illinois 2006

Edited by Cedric Herring. We plan to continue with a book of this kind every two years and Cedric has agreed to continue this effort in 2008.

Policy Forum

IGPA published a *Policy Forum* by Barry Chiswick entitled “Illinois: A Major Destination for Immigrants,” which focused on the places immigrants prefer to settle and the impact they have on public services in those areas.

Policy News

This year’s *Policy News* featured articles on caps on medical malpractice jury awards, the influence of money in Illinois politics, and more.

Trends in Higher Education Funding

IGPA developed a white paper for President B. Joseph White that examined current trends in higher education funding.

The Canadian Health Care System

IGPA also developed a white paper for Illinois House Speaker Michael Madigan’s office on what can be learned from the Canadian health care system which might be used in Illinois.

Methamphetamine Use and Abuse: Sustained Efforts and Increased Synergy

U.S. Senator Richard Durbin’s office requested a white paper on “Methamphetamine Use and Abuse: Sustained Efforts and Increased Synergy” which has been used in discussions with the Governor’s office and with the Illinois Attorney General’s office.

Higher Education Update

IGPA provided the Illinois Board of Higher Education with an update to the report IGPA did on “Illinois Higher Education: Building the Economy, Shaping Society.” This update was distributed and used at the IBHE summit in November of 2005

Flash Index

IGPA continues to publish the “Flash Index” which is highly visible in Illinois and has attracted the interest of the University’s Board of Trustees.

Rachel Gordon, assistant professor of sociology at the University of Illinois at Chicago and a faculty member of IGPA, has received an invitation to join the Editorial Board for volume 68 of the *Journal of Marriage and the Family (JMF)*. *JMF*, published by the National Council on Family Relations, is the leading research journal in the family field and has been so for more than sixty years. *JMF* features original research and theory, research interpretation and reviews, and critical discussion concerning all aspects of marriage, other forms of close relationships, and families. Over the past year, Dr. Gordon has served as an occasional reviewer for volume 67 of the journal.
